#### **Dave Lee (1951/56)**

ne of my roles as a Committee Member of Birkenhead History Society in recent years has been to be responsible for answering Local History questions that arrive via the Society website. One of the most interesting questions that arrived recently concerned the origins of the 'Birkenhead Shield' that is now in the hands of a gentleman in Devon. Mr. Graham Colman had been evacuated from Malta, where his father was serving in the Army, and had been sent to Oswestry in Shropshire where he attended Oswestry Boys High School from 1943-1949.

swestry School no longer exists, but for a number years, Graham Colman has been organising Annual Reunions for those Old Boys of his particular class at school. He explained that a few years ago, in recognition for his efforts, he was presented with a shield that had been one of Oswestry School trophies and bears the name 'The Birkenhead Shield'. It measures 16" x 12", is made of wood, and has a number of silver plaques shaped as shields around its perimeter, which were used for recording the successful School Houses, the earliest date being 1941. Its centre bears a small Birkenhead Institute Visor insignia.

sing the internet he contacted Birkenhead History Society website for possible answers. I was delighted to receive such a reference to the Institute and set about looking for reasons as to how the Birkenhead Shield found its way to Oswestry School in Shropshire as it does not feature in the known list of Institute Trophies.

Period in August 1939 at the outbreak of the war when Headmaster Mr. Wynne Hughes outlined plans called "Evacuation scheme in the event of hostilities." Participation in the scheme must have been optional, some parents choosing to make private arrangements. The Visor reports departure took place on September 3<sup>rd</sup>, just a few hours after the actual declaration of War on Germany. The boys were marched to Woodside where they were boarded on a train that was to take them to Oswestry! It would appear that early difficulties of accommodation were overcome and the life of the School was so efficiently reconstructed that full examinations were sat in December. Visor suggests that those who took part in the Evacuation would never forget the hospitality that was enjoyed and the amount of academic work that took place, to which the excellent Examination results in 1940 bore witness.

o, to return to the Birkenhead Shield, I have not found any written evidence as to its origins, but one can only conclude that at some later date in 1941 Birkenhead Institute Staff presented the shield to Oswestry School as a token of their gratitude for the kindness and hospitality freely given during a worrying and uncertain time, and as a result it was so named.

r Colman reports that when Oswestry Boys High School was amalgamated with a Girls High School 1980 the silver ware was transferred and ended up in a cupboard and forgotten about until a friend of his 'rescued' some of the items. The question is in which cupboard are the Institute Trophies stored and can a home be found where they can be displayed publicly? Also, are there any Old Boys out there who were party to that evacuation and what memories they must have? I am sure the AdVisor Editor would be delighted to hear.

#### Rob Wood (1954/60)

any Old Instonians will recall the School Trophies and were possibly recipients of The trophies were housed in a glass fronted Oak cabinet on the wall placed down the

end of the corridor near the stairs to the Physics laboratory.

he following is a list and when they were acquired.

- 1891 Silver Cup: Presented by Lieutenant Colonel St.John Blake-Campbell of the 1<sup>st</sup> Royal Cheshire Engineers in 1891 for award to the senior boy who has shown the greatest achievement in both study and games.
- 1904 Silver Cup, Presented by Samuel Stitt Esq. JP in 1904 bearing the donor's crest and motto. This was awarded to the junior boy who has proved the best all-rounder of the year.
- 1918 Silver Cup, the earliest of the House trophies. Boys of the School gave this from their earnings at Tilston Fearnal Farm Camp where they did war work in 1918. The cup is awarded annually to the Champion House in Cricket
- 1922 Silver Loving Cup. Purchased with House Funds in 1922 and awarded to the Champion House in Rugby.
- 1922 Chased Silver Cup acquired in 1922. This was at one time awarded to the Victor Ludorum. Became the Tug of War Trophy.
- 1929 Oak Challenge Shield, embellished with engraved silver, the School crest being the centre motif. Won annually by the Champion House in Athletics.
- **1930** Silver Cup presented by the Staff to the Senior House Relay Team.
- 1930 Silver Cup presented by the former Headmaster R. Wynne-Hughes for the Intermediate House Relay Team.
- **1931** Silver Loving Cup presented to the winning House in the Senior Cross Country.
- 1931 Silver Loving Cup (a smaller replica of the previous trophy) Presented by Miss Harkness, formerly the School Secretary. Awarded to the winning House in the Junior Cross Country.
- 1932 Silver Cup presented by Susan Atkin and known as the Atkin Challenge Cup for the Victor Ludorum.
- 1933 Challenge Shield embellished with worked bronze relief presented to the School by the British Chess Federation in recognition of the Institute Chess Team's outstanding performances in the Wright Shield Competition. This is awarded annually to the Champion Chess Player of the School.
- 1934 Silver Cup presented by the Old Boys' Association for the Junior Victor Ludorum.
- 1935 Silver Urn presented by Mrs Jackson (formerly Miss Atkin) for the Mile Champion.
- 1935 Silver Rose Bowl presented by Mrs Barker and awarded to Junior Cross Country Run.
- 1936 Silver Cup purchased from House Funds and awarded to the Champion House at Swimming.
- 1937 Silver Cup presented by Birkenhead Corporation to commemorate the Coronation of King George V1 and Queen Elizabeth. Known as the Coronation Cup, the trophy was awarded to the Champion House.
- **1948** Silver Cup presented by Robert Smith Esq. To commemorate the overall period of 17 years during which his sons J.N.Smith and V.L.Smith attended the School. It is allotted to the winner of the Senior Cross Country Run.



his is a photograph from around 1959, showing Danny Webb with R.F. Salmon in the entrance hall. During my years, (1960/63). the trophy cabinet described above, was in the entrance hall and can clearly be seen. (Keith Dutton)

here maybe other trophies, that were donated since my presence at the Institute 1954-1960 and we would welcome any further information

At present all the School trophies are in the basement of the Williamson Art Gallery in

Slatey Road Birkenhead.

A number of them were put on display at the annual dinner a couple of years ago.

If Old Boys wish to view them Colin Simpson, the Curator, is the person to contact at the Williamson Art Gallery.

inally it is unfortunate these trophies cannot be placed on display since they form an important part of the history of Birkenhead. Alternatively they could be donated to other Schools for their own presentation.


