
My final thanks are due to the County's Centenary Sub-Committee whose members have spared no effort to make this season a memorable one.

## CHESHIRE HISTORY

Although we are celebrating our Centenary this year it must be remembered that a committee was formed in the year 1875. The first game being played in 1876.

From 1876 to 1900 there were only a small number of clubs in membership of the county union, and sadly, due to the advent of the Northern league, some of these went out of existence.

At the early part of century there was a slow assembling of clubs, and by 1936 they numbered 16.

From 1937 to 1976 Rugby Football has become increasingly popular as a participating sport and there was a tremendous increase in players. Consequently, quite a number of clubs were formed and the total of clubs playing rugby in the county now number 46.

The amount of administration from these early years has changed considerably and, where in the late '30's the county affairs were handled by a selected group of dedicated individuals (who also carried on after the 1939-45 war years), it was obvious that pressure of county business demanded a change, and in 1964 it was agreed that every club in the county should each supply a representative to the Cheshire committee.

During the last 30 years (since the second world war), club facilities have improved beyond the imagination. When one thinks that pavilions and changing room luxuries were virtually non existent, and recall changing in stables, old huts etc., with no hot water. Buckets and baths in the open with a cold shower to follow were the habit of the day.

Today there has been tremendous change, and clubs have been very ambitious and the club houses, with modern facilities around the county are places we are justly proud of, and great credit must go to the dedicated workers of these clubs, who by giving their all have strived for the improvement of their clubs.

The game during the late thirties and since the war has blossomed and been nurtured by many schools in the county, and a schools committee was one of the sub committees formed from the new administration of 1964, although a schoolboy committee had operated in 1949 who inherited the precedent set by some clubs, who had taken care of schoolboy games during holiday periods.

The pattern was set and the Schools sub committee (consisting of six main committee members and six schoolmasters) have steadfastly watched schools and studied reports and after trials etc., have turned out successful Cheshire Schools XV's at 19 and 15 age levels.

In 1966 a sub committee was formed to handle colts rugby. This being for young men who do not qualify for schools rugby.

The Annual Individual Membership is £2, and membership for Season 1976-1977 can be obtained by posting same along with this form when completed.


