Blacks regained the lead with Francis (Oldershaw) touching down but then Mc-Ewen raced over for a try for Whites and before the interval Peers (Caldy) added a penalty to give Whites an 11-7 lead.

Ferguson made it 11-11 with a Blacks try but then Peers was on the mark with a second Whites penalty.

In the very last minute Scott (Oldershaw) eluded several tackles for a vital Blacks try and Ferguson goaled for good measure.

The spectators who braved the bitter wind were well rewarded.
